

General Information

Baptism: By appointment. At least one parent as well as the sponsors must be practicing Roman Catholics who attend the Traditional Latin Mass exclusively.

Confession: Before Mass on Sundays, and other times as indicated in the weekly bulletin.

Confirmation: Solemnly administered periodically in the year and may be administered privately by request. Catholics who received confirmation in the post Vatican II rite (1971) should arrange to receive confirmation conditionally in the traditional rite.

First Holy Communion: Administered each year on the Sunday after Corpus Christi. Adequate knowledge of the catechism is required.

Matrimony: If you are contemplating marriage, please make an appointment to speak with a priest before you set a date. At least one of the parties must be a practicing traditional Catholic and member of this parish. Weddings are forbidden during Advent and Lent.

Communion for the Sick: Please contact the pastor or coordinator when a church member is hospitalized or too ill to attend Mass.

Extreme Unction: Do not put off making arrangements until the last moment, but contact the pastor or coordinator promptly if a church member is gravely ill or in danger of death.

Decorum in Church: Respect for God in the Blessed Sacrament requires a reverent silence. Please turn off cell phones and keep children well behaved. Both young and old should wear dignified and modest clothes in church, and women should wear a dress or skirt, and a veil or hat. Veils are available in the vestibule. Men should wear shirt and tie as well as a jacket or sweater.

Holy Communion: Only baptized practicing Catholics in the state of grace may receive Holy Communion. You must be fasting:

- Three hours from solid foods and alcoholic beverages.
- One hour from other liquids.
- Water may be taken at any time.

The communicant kneels at the communion rail, and receives the Blessed Sacrament on the tongue. The communicant does not say "Amen" after the priest says "*Corpus Domini nostri Jesu Christi custodiat animam tuam in vitam aeternam. Amen.*"

Singing: The faithful are invited to join in singing any hymns preceding or following the Mass, but only the choir sings during the course of the Mass.

Following Sunday Mass: During High Mass season, there is a potluck brunch downstairs. Everyone is welcome.

Confirmations will be administered after Mass this morning. Congratulations to our new soldiers of Christ! There will be a reception downstairs to which all are cordially invited.

This week, traditionally a week of solemn prayer, we will have daily Mass. The Rogation Days fall on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. We will have an outdoor procession with the chanting of the Litany of Saints before each of those Masses. Mass begins at 9:30 AM on Monday; and 9:00 AM on Tuesday and 8:00 AM on Wednesday. May Devotions start 15 minutes before Mass.

Thursday is Ascension Thursday, a holy day of obligation. There will be a Low Mass with NO sermon at 6:00 AM. There will also be a High Mass at 6:00 PM with Confessions at 5:15. Attendance at Mass is obligatory under pain of mortal sin.

Mary and the Holy Ghost

True Devotion to the Holy Spirit

St. Louis Marie Grignon de Montfort, in his excellent little treatises *True Devotion to Mary* and *The Secret of Mary* has done no more than establish the most holy Virgin in her place in Christian

piety. The merit of these works is that they show an understanding of

the universal and indispensable function of Mary Immaculate in the sanctification of souls – a traditional doctrine of the Church that obtained the magnificent confirmation of the Holy Apostolic See in modern times when the feast of Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces, was introduced into the Liturgy.

St. Grignon de Montfort understood so clearly the place that belongs to Mary in the work of sanctification that he made devotion to this sweet Mother, not something superficial or intermittent, consisting of isolated practices with a special place and hour in our day, but constant and essential, reaching to the very depths of our heart and filling our whole being and all our life like a heavenly perfume.

The method of Grignon de Montfort is not artificial. It does not impose on Christian life the particular note of filial tenderness that the saint himself professed for the Blessed Virgin. It simply shows how to bring to Christian life the traditional Catholic teaching about Mary. That is, it gives her her proper place as universal Mediatrix of the graces of God.

With even greater reason, then – because He is more forgotten – the Holy Spirit must be given His proper place, the place that rightfully belongs to Him in Christian life and Christian perfection. Devotion to the Holy Spirit must become what St. Grignon de Montfort made of devotion to Mary: something not superficial and intermittent, but constant and profound, filling the depths of souls and impregnating lives with the sweet unction of infinite love.

The Graces of the Ascension

The feast of the Ascension should rekindle in us the desire for heaven, that is, the desire for God. When the disciples saw their Master rise above them and disappear, they remained there, crestfallen; it was as if their lives had been taken away; the sun still shed its brightness; but it seemed cruel and wan; all was empty and desolate. “I am going to meet my God who is your God, to meet my Father and your Father,” our Lord had said. So it seemed to them as though nothing were left for them on earth, as though all their possessions, all their concerns had somehow been displaced and now resided up above, where glances do not reach, where the imagination is lost, where faith, hope, and charity alone give access...when our

place is ready, we will go toward heaven... All will have disappeared from the earth and we will go to heaven, as our Lord did, with the marks of our wounds and the eternal traces of our suffering in His hands and in His feet

and in His side. What we detest now will then be our great wealth, and, in place of good works, we will be able to present to God these poor sufferings which we will have offered most imperfectly, which we have borne for His love because we always wanted to believe that His will is adorable, even when it makes us tremble to our very roots.

By His ascension, our Lord Jesus Christ has already opened heaven to us. We can and should remain concentrated on that place where our true blessings are. It is our duty to build our certainties on the base of our faith and thus accustom ourselves to living serenely.

Confidence

God, a Woman, and the Way – Fr. Raymond

St. Bernard, most well-known of all Cistercian fathers, preached little else than confidence. In one sermon on the birthday of our Blessed Virgin Mother he said to the monks of Clairvaux: “You were afraid to approach the Father...so He gave you Jesus as your mediator. Mary has given Him to you as your Brother. But, perhaps, you fear even Jesus; for in Him there is Divine Majesty since, although He became Man, He, nevertheless, remained God. Do you wish to have an Advocate with Him? Turn to Mary!... The Son will hear His Mother; and the Father will hear the Son. My little children, this is the ladder for sinners. This is my greatest confidence. This, the whole reason for my hope.

We busy people in this hurried, noisy century never take time enough to think on the deep things of God and the only important things of man. How many of us realize vividly just how much we mean to Mary, the Mother of Christ, and how much the Mother of Christ means to us Christians? Adam of Perseigne said, “It is only through her that we can find our way back to God.” And again, “Salvation is the reward of those who find Mary.” Those statements ought to make us pause.

That wise old Cistercian of the Middle Ages also said to his monks: “With what confidence we should be led to God through Mary! For Mary, thou art the Mother of the exiled and the Mother of their King; the Mother of the accused and the Mother of their judge; the Mother of man and the Mother of God. Through you, Mother Mary, we, the accused, have been made brother of the judge.”

Would you be afraid to be judged by your own brother who loved you so much he willingly offered his life for you?
