

General Information

Baptism: By appointment. At least one parent as well as the sponsors must be practicing Roman Catholics who attend the Traditional Latin Mass exclusively.

Confession: Before Mass on Sundays, and other times as indicated in the weekly bulletin.

Confirmation: Solemnly administered periodically in the year and may be administered privately by request. Catholics who received confirmation in the post Vatican II rite (1971) should arrange to receive confirmation conditionally in the traditional rite.

First Holy Communion: Administered each year on the Sunday after Corpus Christi. Adequate knowledge of the catechism is required.

Matrimony: If you are contemplating marriage, please make an appointment to speak with a priest before you set a date. At least one of the parties must be a practicing traditional Catholic and member of this parish. Weddings are forbidden during Advent and Lent.

Communion for the Sick: Please contact the pastor or coordinator when a church member is hospitalized or too ill to attend Mass.

Extreme Unction: Do not put off making arrangements until the last moment, but contact the pastor or coordinator promptly if a church member is gravely ill or in danger of death.

Decorum in Church: Respect for God in the Blessed Sacrament requires a reverent silence. Please turn off cell phones and keep children well behaved. Both young and old should wear dignified and modest clothes in church, and women should wear a dress or skirt, and a veil or hat. Veils are available in the vestibule. Men should wear shirt and tie as well as a jacket or sweater.

Holy Communion: Only baptized practicing Catholics in the state of grace may receive Holy Communion. You must be fasting:

- Three hours from solid foods and alcoholic beverages.
- One hour from other liquids.
- Water may be taken at any time.

The communicant kneels at the communion rail, and receives the Blessed Sacrament on the tongue. The communicant does not say "Amen" after the priest says "*Corpus Domini nostri Jesu Christi custodiat animam tuam in vitam aeternam. Amen.*"

Singing: The faithful are invited to join in singing any hymns preceding or following the Mass, but only the choir sings during the course of the Mass.

Following Sunday Mass: During High Mass season, there is a potluck brunch downstairs. Everyone is welcome.

Weapons of Mass Preservation!

Heaven and hell are locked in mortal combat and the earth shakes from the shock of the encounter; but nobody feels it, nobody sees it, nobody hears it...nobody cares! Our love has become depersonalized and our thoughts have become stereotyped. Our industrial and mass produced civilization is actually doing what its opponents have charged it would do: we are becoming dehumanized! We are not bad people, really, **nor are we really good!** We are mediocre. This is the tragedy! We have traded realities for illusions. There is no passion or fiery aspiration left in us. Our divine ideals have been taken away from us. Our disease is epidemic! Sixteen of the 19 civilizations that have decayed from the beginning of history until now, decayed from within. The conflict today is not for land or national rights, it is for the souls of men; a conflict between the absolute who is God-Man, and the absolute who is man-god: God Who became Man and man who has made himself god! *The religion of the man-god is a new religion without a Cross, a liturgy without a world to come, a religion to destroy all religions.* The forces of evil are united; the forces of good are divided. We cannot unite at the cost of **truth**, but what is needed is a unity of prayer. We may not be able to meet in the same pew, would to God that we could – but we can meet on our **knees!** To a faithless dead-locked world, Our Most Blessed Mother comes offering us a choice: **death in life or life after death!**

The suffering that awaits us is almost without limit. The Rosary and the Scapular are the tangible reminders of the promise of the Mother of God and the means through which she will save the world in the days ahead. Let us fortify ourselves wisely for the trials ahead by putting on her armament: the Scapular. Like the life preserver at sea, it is a type of spiritual “life insurance”.

We desperately need the help of the Mother of God. Our Lady promised St. Dominic: **“One day, through the Rosary and the Scapular, I will save the world”**. Consecrate yourself to the Immaculate Heart of Mary – **wear the Scapular!** The enrollment and wearing of the scapular is a

penance in itself. It is the beginning of our act of reparation for all the evil we have thought or done and for all the good we have neglected to do. Every conversion is a matter of efficacious grace and apostolic activity. The grace is God’s part, and the apostolic activity is our part!

The greatest obstacle in the apostolate of the Church is the timidity or rather cowardice of the faithful.

Holy Communion is the shortest and safest way to Heaven.

There are others: innocence, but that is for little children; penance, but we are afraid of it; generous endurance of trials of life, but when they come we weep and ask to be spared. The surest, easiest, shortest way is the Eucharist.

...the great movement of apostasy being organized in every country for the establishment of a One-World Church which shall have neither dogmas, nor hierarchy, neither discipline for the mind, nor curb for the passions, and which, under the pretext of freedom and human dignity, would bring back to the world (if such a Church could overcome) the reign of legalized cunning and force, and the oppression of the weak, and of all those who toil and suffer. [...] Indeed, the true friends of the people are neither revolutionaries, nor innovators: they are traditionalists.
