

St. Hugh of Lincoln Roman Catholic Church

General Information

Baptism: By appointment. At least one parent as well as the sponsors must be practicing Roman Catholics who attend the Traditional Latin Mass exclusively.

Confession: Before Mass on Sundays, and other times as indicated in the weekly bulletin.

Confirmation: Solemnly administered periodically in the year and may be administered privately by request. Catholics who received confirmation in the post Vatican II rite (1971) should arrange to receive confirmation conditionally in the traditional rite.

First Holy Communion: Administered each year on the Sunday after Corpus Christi. Adequate knowledge of the catechism in required.

Matrimony: If you are contemplating marriage, please make an appointment to speak with a priest before you set a date. At least one of the parties must be a practicing traditional Catholic and member of this parish. Weddings are forbidden during Advent and Lent.

Communion for the Sick: Please contact the pastor or coordinator when a church member is hospitalized or too ill to attend Mass.

Extreme Unction: Do not put off making arrangements until the last moment, but contact the pastor or coordinator promptly if a church member is gravely ill or in danger of death.

Decorum in Church: Respect for God in the Blessed Sacrament requires a reverent silence. Please turn off cell phones and keep children well behaved. Both young and old should wear dignified and modest clothes in church, and women should wear a dress or skirt, and a veil or hat. Veils are available in the vestibule. Men should wear shirt and tie as well as a jacket or sweater.

Holy Communion: Only baptized practicing Catholics in the state of grace may receive Holy Communion. You must be fasting:

- Three hours from solid foods and alcoholic beverages.
- One hour from other liquids.
- Water may be taken at any time.

The communicant kneels at the communion rail, and receives the Blessed Sacrament on the tongue. The communicant does not say "Amen" after the priest says "*Corpus Domini nostri Jesu Christi custodiat animam tuam in vitam aeternam. Amen.*"

Singing: The faithful are invited to join in singing any hymns preceding or following the Mass, but only the choir sings during the course of the Mass.

Following Sunday Mass: During High Mass season, there is a potluck brunch downstairs. Everyone is welcome.

Seven Ways to Introduce the Rosary to Children

1. After tucking the little one in to bed, let him hold his beads, while you whisper the Rosary until he falls asleep.
2. Go to Mass a little earlier and let the children see and hear you pray your Rosary.
3. Turn off the TV and cellphones, and pray the Family Rosary.
4. Say the Rosary aloud in the car, even on short trips, with your children.
5. Pause during the day to kneel down and pray one decade; brief, but beneficial.
6. Let the little one hold up a picture book of the Mysteries during the Family Rosary.
7. Allow your little ones to lead a decade as soon as they can lisp the prayers. Encourage their participation!

A Rosary Reminder

St. Therese of the Child Jesus said, everything centers around Heaven: Heaven gained or lost. This is what life is all about. We need to be reminded of that, especially today. We need to be reminded of what is important, what is eternal. The most Holy Rosary does just that in a special way, in the last set of Mysteries, the Glorious Mysteries. In civil society, today, there are very many things that are out of order and which turn people away from God. There is an aversion to a humble laborious life. There is a great horror of everything that causes suffering and there is total forgetfulness of a future life.

The three sets of Mysteries of the Most Holy Rosary are remedies to rectify these evils which lead us into sin. The Joyful Mysteries are a remedy against our aversion for a humble laborious life. In them, we contemplate the example of the life of the Holy Family. The Sorrowful Mysteries are a remedy against the horror of suffering by showing us the Passion of Our Lord and inviting us to share in it, and finally, the Glorious Mysteries are a remedy against the forgetfulness of future goods by showing us the glory of Our Lord and Our Lady, and the glory that awaits us if we imitate their lives of holiness here below.

If Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical on the Holy Rosary could speak over a century ago of the forgetfulness of man concerning future goods, what would he say today! The future goods and the future evils that await all of us after death are buried in total oblivion! The present life seems to be the be-all and end-all of all things. (In the novus ordo church,) all one hears about from the pulpit is social justice. To speak of Heaven, Hell, Purgatory, Death and Judgment is considered strangely bizarre. Meditation on the Glorious Mysteries of the Holy Rosary brings us back to reality! Here, we contemplate the glory of Our Lady; that glory in which each one of us is called to participate personally. God created us to invite us to the great marriage feast which is Heaven!!! But, will we participate in this glory? Will we go to Heaven? Each one of us can ask Our Lady, just like Lucia, “And I, will I go to Heaven?” Or, will we be like the man

at the wedding feast who did not have on the wedding garment and was thrown out into the street where there was weeping and gnashing of teeth?
