

### General Information

**Baptism:** By appointment. At least one parent as well as the sponsors must be practicing Roman Catholics who attend the Traditional Latin Mass exclusively.

**Confession:** Before Mass on Sundays, and other times as indicated in the weekly bulletin.

**Confirmation:** Solemnly administered periodically in the year and may be administered privately by request. Catholics who received confirmation in the post Vatican II rite (1971) should arrange to receive confirmation conditionally in the traditional rite.

**First Holy Communion:** Administered each year on the Sunday after Corpus Christi. Adequate knowledge of the catechism is required.

**Matrimony:** If you are contemplating marriage, please make an appointment to speak with a priest before you set a date. At least one of the parties must be a practicing traditional Catholic and member of this parish. Weddings are forbidden during Advent and Lent.

**Communion for the Sick:** Please contact the pastor or coordinator when a church member is hospitalized or too ill to attend Mass.

**Extreme Unction:** Do not put off making arrangements until the last moment, but contact the pastor or coordinator promptly if a church member is gravely ill or in danger of death.

**Decorum in Church:** Respect for God in the Blessed Sacrament requires a reverent silence. Please turn off cell phones and keep children well behaved. Both young and old should wear dignified and modest clothes in church, and women should wear a dress or skirt, and a veil or hat. Veils are available in the vestibule. Men should wear shirt and tie as well as a jacket or sweater.

**Holy Communion:** Only baptized practicing Catholics in the state of grace may receive Holy Communion. You must be fasting:

- Three hours from solid foods and alcoholic beverages.
- One hour from other liquids.
- Water may be taken at any time.

The communicant kneels at the communion rail, and receives the Blessed Sacrament on the tongue. The communicant does not say "Amen" after the priest says "*Corpus Domini nostri Jesu Christi custodiat animam tuam in vitam aeternam. Amen.*"

**Singing:** The faithful are invited to join in singing any hymns preceding or following the Mass, but only the choir sings during the course of the Mass.

**Our Mother’s Month of May:  
The Springtime of Our Lives**

The celebrated Jesuit poet of the later nineteenth century, Gerald Manley Hopkins, asks in his poem *Thy May Magnificat* a simple question:

*May is Mary’s month, and I  
Muse at that and wonder why:  
Her feasts follow reason,  
Dated due to season—*

Every May we turn to Mary and honor her anew. We crown her, we bring her flowers, we pray the rosary with a renewed devotion. And why May for all this? There is nothing in Scripture pointing to this “extended feast” of May for Mary. There is nothing on the Church’s calendar either that makes May any more likely than any other month to honor her.

The answer to May’s devotion is simply found in life. The poet gives the clue:

*Ask of her, thy mighty mother:  
Her reply puts this other  
Question: What is Spring?—  
Growth in every thing—*

May is the month of Mary because it is the month for spring growth and beauty. It is the month of fragrance and freshness. It is the month of life and light. It is not a Church calendar that points us to Mary; it is our heart’s desire for what Mary represents and what she always offers: “growth in every thing.”



### ***St. Joseph***

St. Joseph, husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary and foster-father of the Child Jesus, faithfully and humbly carried out the difficult and glorious mission entrusted to him by God and thus become the model of domestic virtues and humble daily toil, the guardian of chaste souls and the protector of Christian homes. Veneration of St. Joseph is of relatively recent introduction in the Church's liturgy. The feast, ob-

served locally on various dates, was fixed during the fifteenth century on March 19 and added to the general calendar of the Church in 1621 by Gregory XV. This feast became obligatory on the Universal Church after the occupation of Rome by the troops of Victor Emmanuel II. Pius IX proclaimed St. Joseph Patron of the oppressed Household of the Faith, and entrusted to him the defense of the Catholic Church in 1847.

In her liturgy the Church attributes to St. Josepha special power of intercession on behalf of the dying. This most holy patriarch was assisted in his own agony by Jesus and Mary, in whose arms he gave up his soul to God, more by the force of love than by that of suffering.
