To Be Saints in the Midst of the World

This temptation to forget our vocation of sanctity is not something recent. During St. Francis de Sales' life, in the 17th century, the idea prevailed that sanctity was reserved only for people who removed themselves from the world, entered into the religious life and shut themselves behind the cloisters of monasteries. However, "it is an error, if not heresy, to wish to banish the devout life from soldiers and sailors, mechanics and tradesmen, the statesman's office, or the home of married people....

Wherever we are, we can and should aspire to a perfect life." (*Introduction to the Devout Life*) This still remains true today.

We must push aside all false pretexts of overwork or burnout and rediscover the true hierarchy of values. It is at the very heart of our life, in the midst of our activities that we must sanctify ourselves, not outside of our family or professional life, nor outside our leisure activities. To be saints is to blossom like Christ Who steers us towards total success in our lives. We all have, at the very depth of our beings, an ardent thirst for happiness, a very firm will to succeed. Do we have any doubts that only Christ can steer us to this happiness, to this success? He is the Savior.

Strategy for Calming Emotions

What should we do when we feel all our emotions suddenly rising up in turmoil? We must not force ourselves to undertake many measures in order to conquer them and bring them back to duty; if we do that, they may get the better of us. Rather, in the highest part of our soul, we must simply join ourselves to God's will, humble ourselves and, from that moment, keep close to God in peace and in the greatest

tranquility we can manage. We must do as our threshers did today on board their boat, which was carrying our wheat on the lake. Suddenly they found themselves in great peril: a violent storm arose in an instant and threatened to sink them with the boat and everything on it. What did they do? They did not obstinately set themselves to go straight against the current through these great waves. If they had done that, they would have been lost. Instead, they followed the little waves and very skillfully, very gently, brought their boat to shore. They managed to land by avoiding the storm, not by battling against it.

Here is a little model of what we should do when we are taken by surprise as we row peacefully in our little boat. When all our emotions arise to stir up a great internal storm that seems certain to overwhelm us or drag us after it, we must not wish to calm this tempest ourselves. Rather, we must gently draw near the shore, keeping our will firmly in God, and coast along the little waves; by humble knowledge of ourselves, we will reach God, Who is our sure port. Let us go gently along without agitation and anxiety and without giving in to our emotions. By doing so, we shall make it to that divine port—with some delay, but with more glory than if we had enjoyed perfect calm and had navigated our little boat without any challenges.

General Information

Baptism: By appointment. At least one parent as well as the sponsors must be practicing Roman Catholics who attend the Traditional Latin Mass exclusively.

Confession: Before Mass on Sundays, and other times as indicated in the weekly bulletin.

Confirmation: Solemnly administered periodically in the year and may be administered privately by request. Catholics who received confirmation in the post Vatican II rite (1971) should arrange to receive confirmation conditionally in the traditional rite.

First Holy Communion: Administered each year on the Sunday after Corpus Christi. Adequate knowledge of the catechism is required.

Matrimony: If you are contemplating marriage, please make an appointment to speak with a priest before you set a date. At least one of the parties must be a practicing traditional Catholic and member of this parish. Weddings are forbidden during Advent and Lent.

Communion for the Sick: Please contact the pastor or coordinator when a church member is hospitalized or too ill to attend Mass.

Extreme Unction: Do not put off making arrangements until the last moment, but contact the pastor or coordinator promptly if a church member is gravely ill or in danger of death.

Decorum in Church: Respect for God in the Blessed Sacrament requires a reverent silence. Please turn off cell phones and keep children well behaved. Both young and old should wear dignified and modest clothes in church, and women should wear a dress or skirt, and a veil or hat. Veils are available in the vestibule. Men should wear shirt and tie as well as a jacket or sweater.

Holy Communion: Only baptized practicing Catholics in the state of grace may receive Holy Communion. You must be fasting:

- Three hours from solid foods and alcoholic beverages.
- One hour from other liquids.
- Water may be taken at any time.

The communicant kneels at the communion rail, and receives the Blessed Sacrament on the tongue. The communicant does not say “Amen” after the priest says “*Corpus Domini nostri Jesu Christi custodiat animam tuam in vitam aeternam. Amen.*”

Singing: The faithful are invited to join in singing any hymns preceding or following the Mass, but only the choir sings during the course of the Mass.

FRIDAY IN LENT III *THE FIVE HOLY WOUNDS*

Consider the eternal love which God had borne you; for even before our blessed Lord Jesus Christ became man and suffered on the Cross for you, His Divine Majesty foresaw you in His sovereign goodness and loved you exceedingly. When did He begin to love you? When He began to be God. And when was His beginning? Never, for He has always been, without beginning and without end: wherefore He has always loved you, and from eternity prepared the favors and graces which He has bestowed upon you. And by His prophet He says (and He speaks to you as much as to any), “I have loved thee with an everlasting love; therefore I have drawn thee, taking pity on thee” (Jer. xxxi. 3). Amongst other things, then, He thought to lead you to resolve on serving Him.

SATURDAY IN LENT III

“Let us run to Mary, and, as her little children, cast ourselves into her arms with a perfect confidence.” – *St. Francis de Sales*

William Fitzgerald notes, “Calling on Mary to ‘remember’ is an act of boldness, but it is boldness justified by tradition... Mary needs no reminder of her role in the realm of salvation. However, those who call upon her do require such re-

mindings, if not specifically then more generally—to remind them of their place as supplicants before the Virgin Mary. Asking Mary to intercede as Advocate does not guarantee that a specific request will be granted, only that divine assistance will be.”

Resolution: To recite frequently, with a bold confidence, the Memorare.

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT


Children who have a good father ought to imitate him and follow his commandment in all things. Now, we have a Father better than all others and from Whom all good is derived. [Jas. 1:17]. His commandments can be nothing but perfect and salutary. Thus we should imitate Him as perfectly as possible, and also obey His divine ordinances. But of all His precepts, there is none which He stresses so earnestly, nor for which He has indicated that He desires so exact an observance, as that of the love of neighbor. The Commandment to love God is higher than the Commandment to love neighbor; but since nature offers greater resistance to the love of neighbor, it was necessary that we should be encouraged in a more particular manner to its practice.

MONDAY IN LENT III

Let us then unite our hearts to these celestial spirits and blessed souls, so that as the young nightingale learns to sing from the older ones, surely by the sacred communion which we have with the Saints we may the better pray and praise our God. “I will sing praise unto Thee,” said David, “in the sight of the Angels” (Ps. cxxxvii. 1).

TUESDAY IN LENT III

Honor, reverence, and love the holy and glorious Virgin Mary, for she is the Mother of our Lord, and therefore our Mother also. Fly to her as her child, and cast yourself at her knees with a perfect confidence at all times, and on all occasions. Call on this dear Mother, appeal to her maternal love, and strive to imitate her virtues. Familiarize yourself with the thought of the holy Angels, and honor especially the Angel Guardian of the diocese in which you live, and those of your neighbors, and above all your own. Call on them and honor them frequently, and ask their help in all your affairs, temporal as well as spiritual.

WEDNESDAY IN LENT III

The holy Peter Lefèvre, first priest, preacher, and lector in theology of the Society of Jesus, and earliest companion of St. Ignatius its founder, on returning one day from Germany where he had done great things for the glory of our Lord, happened to pass his birthplace which was in this diocese. He related that in journeying through districts infected by heresy he had received many consolations through a practice he had adopted of sa-

luting the Guardian Angel of each parish on his entering it; and he said that he sensibly experienced their help both in guarding him from ambushes of the heretics, and also in rendering several souls mild and docile to receive the doctrines of salvation.

THURSDAY IN LENT III

The Christian should love husband or wife with a calm, tranquil, firm and constant love, chiefly because God desires and enjoins us to do so. The same reason holds good as to children and other relatives and friends, each one according to his rank. But as a general thing, what is the state of your heart with regard to your neighbor? Do you love him from your heart and for the love of God? In order to prove this, you must call to mind certain disagreeable, troublesome individuals, for with such it is that we practice the love of God towards our neighbor, and still more towards those who do us any injury either in word or deed. Try whether your heart is clear with regard to such, and whether you have to force it to love them?

Are you slow to speak evil of your neighbor, especially of those whom you do not like? Do you never injure him either directly or indirectly? A very little reflection will easily satisfy you on these points.
