## **G.K. Chesterton—Knight of Our Lady**

Of the indications of that flair for Catholic truth which manifested itself in G.K. Chesterton prior to his submission to Rome, hardly anything is so remarkable as his reverence for Mary, the Blessed Mother of God.

From early boyhood, with the rest of the family circle, he had been accustomed to speak with respect of the Blessed Virgin, although he did not go so far as praying to her. That this reverence was nothing superficial is clear from the fact that Belloc, his intimate friend, stated in a letter to Chesterton in 1907 that their common love for the Blessed Virgin was a bond which all other differences could not sunder.

Such, indeed, was his respect for Mary that it inspired him, even in these early years, to play the role of her defender, when a man of note in the intellectual world grossly insulted her. Of Swinburne's blasphemous "Hymn to Proserpine," he wrote such a parody in reverse that that vile insult was transformed into a sublime tribute to the Blessed Mother of God.

In early youth, too, his interest in art sometimes moved him to record his impression in poetic form, when contemplating Our Lady in a masterpiece of the canvas. Thus, for instance, whilst pondering on the *Nativity* of Botticelli, he wrote:

*Do you blame me that I sit hours before this picture?  
But if I walked all over the world in this time  
I should hardly see anything worth seeing that is not in this  
picture.*

### **Our Lady of Pompeii**

*In 1875 a humble painting of Our Lady was set up in a chapel near the ancient city of Pompeii, Italy, to encourage devotion to the Rosary. Invocation of Mary at this shrine resulted in many remarkable cures and conversions; the modest chapel was raised to basilica rank and is now one of the most famous sanctuaries of Our Lady.*

O Virgin immaculate and Queen of the Rosary, in these days of dead faith and triumphant impiety, thou hast been pleased to establish thy throne as Queen and Mother in the ancient land of Pompeii, once the home of paganism. From that place, where men of old worshipped idols and evil spirits, do thou this day, as the Mother of divine graces, scatter far and wide the treasures of heaven's mercy.

Ah, from that throne where thou reignest in mercy, turn, dear Mother, thine eyes of pity even upon me and be gracious unto me who have so great need of thine assistance. Show thyself to me, even as thou hast shown thyself to so many others, a true Mother of mercy: "Monstra te esse Matrem" (show thyself a Mother); while with all my heart I salute thee and invoke thee as my sovereign Lady and Queen of the Most Holy Rosary.

## General Information

**Baptism:** By appointment. At least one parent as well as the sponsors must be practicing Roman Catholics who attend the Traditional Latin Mass exclusively.

**Confession:** Before Mass on Sundays, and other times as indicated in the weekly bulletin.

**Confirmation:** Solemnly administered periodically in the year and may be administered privately by request. Catholics who received confirmation in the post Vatican II rite (1971) should arrange to receive confirmation conditionally in the traditional rite.

**First Holy Communion:** Administered each year on the Sunday after Corpus Christi. Adequate knowledge of the catechism is required.

**Matrimony:** If you are contemplating marriage, please make an appointment to speak with a priest before you set a date. At least one of the parties must be a practicing traditional Catholic and member of this parish. Weddings are forbidden during Advent and Lent.

**Communion for the Sick:** Please contact the pastor or coordinator when a church member is hospitalized or too ill to attend Mass.

**Extreme Unction:** Do not put off making arrangements until the last moment, but contact the pastor or coordinator promptly if a church member is gravely ill or in danger of death.

**Decorum in Church:** Respect for God in the Blessed Sacrament requires a reverent silence. Please turn off cell phones and keep children well behaved. Both young and old should wear dignified and modest clothes in church, and women should wear a dress or skirt, and a veil or hat. Veils are available in the vestibule. Men should wear shirt and tie as well as a jacket or sweater.

**Holy Communion:** Only baptized practicing Catholics in the state of grace may receive Holy Communion. You must be fasting:

- Three hours from solid foods and alcoholic beverages.
- One hour from other liquids.
- Water may be taken at any time.

The communicant kneels at the communion rail, and receives the Blessed Sacrament on the tongue. The communicant does not say “Amen” after the priest says “*Corpus Domini nostri Jesu Christi custodiat animam tuam in vitam aeternam. Amen.*”

**Singing:** The faithful are invited to join in singing any hymns preceding or following the Mass, but only the choir sings during the course of the Mass.
