Seven Ways of Increasing in the Love of God

1. Take three seconds before each action to say to God: "I offer You this action because I love You."
2. Take three seconds to reflect when anything displeases you, and say: "In union with Your Sacred Sufferings I offer this to You, in atonement for my sins."
3. Take three seconds to say to Our Blessed Lord: "Lord Jesus, forgive me, and let me love You"—if you have been guilty of any sin or fault.
4. Take three seconds, when envy or jealousy stirs up within you, to say: "May every soul love You, my God; increase in my soul Your Love."

5. Take three seconds, when you are tired and weary, to say: "I am glad to suffer this weariness and fatigue with the weariness and fatigue You suffered when upon earth. I love You."
6. Take three seconds, to make a resolution not to neglect any duty because it is difficult, and say: "Lord Jesus, I will do this task immediately, and in doing it, I will be loving You."
7. Take three seconds, many times a day and look up to Jesus and say: "With all my soul, I love and thank You for Your countless blessings to me."

Our Guardian Angel

St. Cyril tells us that our guardian angel acts towards us the part of a zealous teacher, dispelling error from our minds. St. Bernard assures us that he fulfills the office of a kind admonisher, urging us to the practice of piety; St. Ambrose says our good angel makes himself our protector, to ward off from us the attacks of those who would injure us; and were he not thus to defend us, it would be impossible for us to escape for one moment from the snares of our hellish foes. Finally, we have the express declaration from the lips of King David, that God has given His angels charge over us, to keep us in all our ways.

And if such is the care he takes of us our lifetime, what, think you, will he not do for us at the hour of death? That hour is oftentimes the hour of cruelest dereliction: friends and relatives either leave us or are impotent to help us. But in this hour of anguish, our angel guardian does not forsake us. He stands a faithful companion beside our dying bed, knowing that to be the moment when the devil redoubles his efforts; when all hell combines to drag the unhappy soul down to perdition. He will render her the most powerful assistance. He will dispel the alarm caused by apprehension of the future; he will soothe the mind, agitated by the remembrance of past sins; he will inspire the heart with confidence in the divine mercy. He will see that we are fortified by the presence of God's ministers, and by the reception of the last rites of the Church; he will not leave us until our soul, freed from the body, stands before her judge. He will then undertake our defense, he will plead our cause, he will visit us in purgatory and obtain for us the suffrages of the faithful, never resting until by his unremitting efforts, we are admitted into our heavenly country.

General Information

Baptism: By appointment. At least one parent as well as the sponsors must be practicing Roman Catholics who attend the Traditional Latin Mass exclusively.

Confession: Before Mass on Sundays, and other times as indicated in the weekly bulletin.

Confirmation: Solemnly administered periodically in the year and may be administered privately by request. Catholics who received confirmation in the post Vatican II rite (1971) should arrange to receive confirmation conditionally in the traditional rite.

First Holy Communion: Administered each year on the Sunday after Corpus Christi. Adequate knowledge of the catechism is required.

Matrimony: If you are contemplating marriage, please make an appointment to speak with a priest before you set a date. At least one of the parties must be a practicing traditional Catholic and member of this parish. Weddings are forbidden during Advent and Lent.

Communion for the Sick: Please contact the pastor or coordinator when a church member is hospitalized or too ill to attend Mass.

Extreme Unction: Do not put off making arrangements until the last moment, but contact the pastor or coordinator promptly if a church member is gravely ill or in danger of death.

Decorum in Church: Respect for God in the Blessed Sacrament requires a reverent silence. Please turn off cell phones and keep children well behaved. Both young and old should wear dignified and modest clothes in church, and women should wear a dress or skirt, and a veil or hat. Veils are available in the vestibule. Men should wear shirt and tie as well as a jacket or sweater.

Holy Communion: Only baptized practicing Catholics in the state of grace may receive Holy Communion. You must be fasting:

- Three hours from solid foods and alcoholic beverages.
- One hour from other liquids.
- Water may be taken at any time.

The communicant kneels at the communion rail, and receives the Blessed Sacrament on the tongue. The communicant does not say “Amen” after the priest says “*Corpus Domini nostri Jesu Christi custodiat animam tuam in vitam aeternam. Amen.*”

Singing: The faithful are invited to join in singing any hymns preceding or following the Mass, but only the choir sings during the course of the Mass.
