The Assumption

What, then, had taken place? Something foreshadowed ages before by the carrying up of the Ark to Jerusalem, with all the pomp and circumstance of David's solemn procession. In a very real sense Mary was the Ark of God. The Ark of old was formed of incorruptible wood; the Mother, whose pure bosom had been the dwelling place of God's only begotten Son, was always free from the taint of corruption wrought by Adam's transgression. The material Ark was overlaid both within and without with pure gold; Mary's interior life was resplendent with every virtue. Of her the psalmist sings: "The glory of the King's daughter is within golden borders, clothed round about with varieties" (Ps 44:14-15). Her life in the eyes of men, moreover, was a perfect example of holiness; she was "the Queen...in gilded clothing" (Ps 44:10).

That twenty-third psalm, applied by the Church to Christ's glorious Ascension, may be fittingly adapted, as we have said, to Mary's entry into the courts of heaven. For she who had been in closest union with her Son on earth, conformed with Him also in His triumph after death. God would not suffer His "Holy One to see corruption" in the tomb. After three days, He would raise her to immortal life, and His angels would bear her to realms of bliss.

How far more magnificent that progress than the transfer of the material Ark of old! In place of David, King of the earthly Jerusalem, the "Prince of the kings of the earth" (Apoc 1:5) is foremost in welcoming her to the tabernacle prepared for her. No guard of honor composed of mere earthly warriors, however noble and distinguished, is worthy to escort her: hosts of radiant angels fill the expanse of heaven to do her honor. In place of the feeble strains of earthly melodies from human lips, the canticles of heaven resound, poured forth by angelic voices. Instead of harp and psaltery and golden cymbal, are heard celestial harmonies of ravishing sweetness.

The Importance of the Catechism

If the importance of the Little Catechism were everywhere recognized, and the obligation of parents and pastors to impress its lessons on the minds of children were fully realized, the folly of considering this an easy task, to be accomplished by almost anyone during an hour's teaching on Sunday, would be less general than it is. The decay of faith in the present generation of Catholics, the elasticity of conscience, impiety, indifference, and other evils so widely spread, are the bitter fruits of this egregious folly, which is by no means restricted to our own country.

About 180 years ago a number of families, related and living in the same neighborhood, emigrated—some to the United States and others to certain of the British colonies—from one of the most Catholic of all countries. Of the former band hardly one remains a Catholic. The parents had never been taught the Catechism, and they did not teach it to their children. The Faith had simply died out among them, to the surprise and

scandal of their relations in Australia and the mother-country. There are hundreds of Italians in South America who not only never go near a church, but are among the avowed enemies of the Catholic religion. Their ignorance of its doctrines is such that it was an easy matter for infidels and sectarians to seduce them; and as soon as they abandoned religious practices they were lost.

...Let us be persuaded of the paramount importance of the Little Catechism, recalling the words of a great Pontiff: "The child that grows up unconscious of the duties of religion will ignore the duties of man."

General Information

Baptism: By appointment. At least one parent as well as the sponsors must be practicing Roman Catholics who attend the Traditional Latin Mass exclusively.

Confession: Before Mass on Sundays, and other times as indicated in the weekly bulletin.

Confirmation: Solemnly administered periodically in the year and may be administered privately by request. Catholics who received confirmation in the post Vatican II rite (1971) should arrange to receive confirmation conditionally in the traditional rite.

First Holy Communion: Administered each year on the Sunday after Corpus Christi. Adequate knowledge of the catechism is required.

Matrimony: If you are contemplating marriage, please make an appointment to speak with a priest before you set a date. At least one of the parties must be a practicing traditional Catholic and member of this parish. Weddings are forbidden during Advent and Lent.

Communion for the Sick: Please contact the pastor or coordinator when a church member is hospitalized or too ill to attend Mass.

Extreme Unction: Do not put off making arrangements until the last moment, but contact the pastor or coordinator promptly if a church member is gravely ill or in danger of death.

Decorum in Church: Respect for God in the Blessed Sacrament requires a reverent silence. Please turn off cell phones and keep children well behaved. Both young and old should wear dignified and modest clothes in church, and women should wear a dress or skirt, and a veil or hat. Veils are available in the vestibule. Men should wear shirt and tie as well as a jacket or sweater.

Holy Communion: Only baptized practicing Catholics in the state of grace may receive Holy Communion. You must be fasting:

- Three hours from solid foods and alcoholic beverages.
- One hour from other liquids.
- Water may be taken at any time.

The communicant kneels at the communion rail, and receives the Blessed Sacrament on the tongue. The communicant does not say "Amen" after the priest says "Corpus Domini nostri Jesu Christi custodiat animam tuam in vitam aeternam. Amen."

Singing: The faithful are invited to join in singing any hymns preceding or following the Mass, but only the choir sings during the course of the Mass.
